




Site Context

Kardinia House is situated in the Geelong suburb of Belmont, and is historically significant as one of the oldest residences in the Geelong region.

The original stone house (c. 1850) is still present, though it was extended and renovated in the 1860s and again in the 1880s.

The house has an elevated position within the landscape with views from the house to the Barwon River as well as views of the house from across the River.

Site History

Geelong and Barwon River

The location of Kardinia House presents a rich history and opportunity to celebrate both pre and post European cultural heritage.

For the Wadawurrung people, the traditional custodians of the land, the Barwon River provides essential resources and served as a vital trade route, with many sacred sites and stories connected to the landscape.

In the 1850s James Austin, a prominent pastoralist, developed Kardinia House. Kardinia House has served various roles, including as a private residence, a school, and a social venue. The surrounding garden, featuring both Indigenous and exotic plants, present the site's historic character and ecological relevance.

















Town Houses Shared GardensPrecedents

The proposed pedestrian lanes and shared gardens are designed to create a lush, immersive landscape to complement the proposed Architecture. They will incorporate a mixture of exotic and native planting and will soften the built form.

- 7 MAIL BOX DESIGN INTEGRATED WITH ARCHITECTURE
















Park View TH Private Courtyards Precedents

The proposed private courtyards are designed to create a lush and formal landscape to complement the proposed Architecture. Incorporating a balance of native and exotic plant species and semi-permeable fencing will enable containment although maintain view of the Barwon River and across Kardinia Gardens.




- PLANTING AS BOUNDARY: CELEBRATE MATURE TREES AND 'KARDINIA' (MORNING/SUNSET)
